

# ALTERNATE POWER SOURCES SAVE YOU MONEY

The Clinton Township Division of Fire is leading the way as the first department in the area to install alternative power sources, battery tenders and no-idle systems, on vehicles. When emergency vehicles are on the scene of certain incidents such as auto accidents, gas leaks and emergency medical incidents, they can experience long hours of idle time. This month the Division will be replacing E61, a 2012 Pierce Pumper and M61, a 2017 Braun F550 Ambulance. The new fire truck will have a new no-idle system that will allow the motor to be turned off when typically idling. This will save our taxpayers thousands of dollars in fuel and maintenance costs. The new medic vehicle will have a battery tender system to maintain the electrical system when idling, again reducing maintenance costs.

planting in the Township. Public Works Superintendent Fleig is creating an inventory of current public trees and the plan is to plant some more public trees this Fall. There will eventually be new trees in our various parks and playgrounds on both sides of the Township. Residents met with Trustee Cera in the Spring, discussed the first steps in the program, and examined a list of possible trees.

"We thought we would start this year doing some Fall planting in our parks, and next year we hope to devise an application for residents who may be interested in having a street tree in front of their home," Trustee Cera said.

Although information on street tree applications will not be available until sometime next year, there will be another meeting this Fall on each side of the Township to mark future tree locations in the parks. On October 24<sup>th</sup> meet at Case Rd Community Garden at 10AM and on October 31<sup>st</sup>, meet at the west side playground at 10 AM. #### Protect Yourself From Holiday Thieves

If you're going to be out of town, the Clinton Township Police offers house checks to our residents any time of year. Simply call the office at 614-471-1479 and let staff know your information, your travel dates, and emergency contact information and we will put it on the watch list.

While out shopping, keep your purses and wallets close to yourself and not laying in your shopping cart. Thieves look for opportunities to steal from distracted shoppers. Only take the cash or credit card your going to use shopping so if something does occur you don't have to cancel or replace multiple credit cards.

When shopping multiple places PLEASE hide your packages in the trunk or out of sight when not in your vehicle. Place your packages out of sight before you park at you next destination. Thieves will drive around the parking lots and walk up and down rows of cars looking for the ultimate smash and grab opportunity.

If you expect to get packages delivered when you are not going to be home, please use a location or private business that will accept and hold your packages. Porch pirates have continued to be a big issue even with doorbell cameras and home surveillance systems. Don't let them ruin your festivities.

In additional to new sidewalk on the south side of Ormond between Walford Street and Cleveland Avenue, Franklin County has worked to install a new drainage system and storm sewer pipes.



## PARKING PASS UPDATES FOR 2022

Clinton Township will be replacing the University View window tag parking permits before the end of year when they expire. Two parking permits will be distributed to each household, allowing residents to park in areas other than your driveway. The new passes will be valid for two years, after which time the Township will mail 2024/2025 stickers to update the passes. If you move, please leave the passes for the new residents.




#### **ADA Curb Ramp Project Underway**

The Franklin County Engineers Office is overseeing a project funded by the Township that will improve pedestrian safety along Walford St.

Crews have begun installing a total of 12 detectable ramps at Lehner, Ward, Ferris, and Case Roads, as well as Ormond, Radnor and Elmore Avenues.

The raised bumps on the ramps alert visually impaired users about the location of intersections.

# A Coyote is in your Backyard! What Should You Do?

From the Ohio Division of Wildlife

- 1. Understand that coyotes are common throughout Ohio's 88 counties in both rural and urban settings. There are no wild wolves living in Ohio.
- **2.** Identify that the canine is truly a coyote and not a stray dog. If you determine that the animal is a stray dog, contact your county dog warden.
- 3. If you do have a coyote on your property, remove all "attractants" to possibly deter the coyote from returning. This includes removing garbage and pet food before nightfall and cleaning up around the grill. Coyotes prey primarily on small mammals such as rabbits and mice. Small pets may also be taken. Keep small dogs and cats inside or stay with them at night when coyotes are most active. Coyotes are curious, but generally fearful of humans. Clap your hands and shout to scare off coyotes that are investigating your yard.
- 4. If the coyote visiting your yard seems to lack a fear of humans or is presenting a conflict even after removing attractants from your yard, contact a nuisance trapper. You can locate a trapper near you by calling the Division of Wildlife at 1-800-WILDLIFE (945-3543). Coyotes in rural areas can be controlled through legal hunting and trapping methods.
